Course Objective: Traveling to Italy gives us a unique opportunity to think about the Roman achievement through history, literature, art, and architecture. Roman's recognized that the idea of being Roman was a matter of culture rather than birth, and as such, they borrowed from the cultures of people spanning from modern day France, Spain, Northern Africa, the Near East, and Greece. Through this study trip, we will trace Rome from its humble origins as a collection of mud huts on the Tiber to mistress of the Mediterranean. We will then travel out of Rome to think about the influence of the mighty city on the landscape of central Italy, and finally, we shall return back to Rome to think about the transition from pagan to Christian Rome. Through this all, we will think about the ever-evolving Eternal City.

Participation/Attendance: Attendance at all non-optional site visits and discussions is essential for this course. Missing one site visit will result in failure for the course. Our class will be driven primarily by group discussion, and as a result, it is essential that you have the material read and that you are willing to discuss what you have read. It is important for us to ask questions, question assumptions, and push our understanding of the Roman world.

Assignments:

Daily Journal: You will be expected to keep a daily journal while we are on the trip. Your journal should contain thoughtful reflections on the readings, sites we have visited during the day, and surprising discoveries that you have made about the Romans. As you write your journal, you should pay attention to careful writing in terms of spelling, grammar, and mechanics. Each entry in your journal should be 1-2 pages in length and should be completed by our evening discussion time. You will submit your whole journal at the end of the trip once we are back in the US.

Final Paper: When we return to the US, you will need to write a 2500-3000 word paper that covers significant aspects of the development of the Roman world that we have explored during the trip. You will be expected to incorporate several sources that we have looked at during the course of our trip.

Vesuvius Digital Story Project: When we return to the US, you will be expected to develop a digital story making use of photos that have been taken from members of our group. For this project, you will try to imagine what it was like to be an ancient in Herculaneum or Vesuvius on the day of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 CE. You will get to choose from one of several profiles as the basis for your imagination.
