

2004 is a very special year for the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences as we celebrate our first 100 years of excellence in pharmacy education in Indiana. Graduates from three institutions (Winona Technical Institute, Indianapolis College of Pharmacy and Butler University) contribute to this very special achievement. The theme of this celebration is quite appropriate:

Honoring Tradition, Pioneering Change

Honoring Tradition:

We are proud of our 3,000+ pharmacy graduates who have gone on to become leading practitioners in retail and hospital pharmacies, industry, education and research. We have put together a series of events and programs over the next year that will recognize our history of excellence in pharmaceutical education. For example, the history of the college is being written. This work will trace the changes in pharmaceutical education at Butler over the last 100 years. I am confident that it will be an excellent record of our history and will chronicle the contributions that our graduates have made to the profession of pharmacy.

This year we are also initiating a Distinguished Alumni program. The designation Distinguished Alumnus/Alumna will be bestowed upon graduates who have made significant contributions to society, the profession and/or the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. We have received over 50 nominations for the inaugural class. The selection of the first 25 Distinguished Alumni will be completed in June and will be formally recognized at the Centennial Gala on Oct. 2. We take great pride in the contributions these alumni have made to pharmacy and the people they serve. From this time forward, we will continue to recognize the contributions of our alumni each year by bestowing the designation Distinguished Alumni on two to three recipients.

Pioneering Change:

We cannot rest on our laurels. Instead, we must forge ahead with new initiatives and pioneer change. Examples of these exciting changes are featured on the pages of this newsletter. For example, the PA program is admitting students to the new PA master's program. We have new programs such as the Health Education Center, the technology-enhanced learning initiative and an exciting new direction in postgraduate education. Pharmaceutical science research will be reinvigorated under the direction of our new chair of pharmaceutical sciences, Dr. Sudip Das, and we have hired a new faculty member in health outcomes, Dr. Iftekar Kalsekar. It is a very exciting time for the college!

We recognize we must work to remain on the cutting edge of practice and education if we are to describe a new level of excellence for the next 100 years. To help us, we have initiated a Distinguished Lecture Series that will bring in national and international experts to help us exceed today's definition of excellence for physician assistant and pharmacy education and establish an exciting new future. Drs. Edward and Margaret Rowe have bequeathed a \$3.3 million gift to the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences for an endowed chair. It is the first endowed deanship at Butler. It is believed to be only the third endowed deanship for a college or school of pharmacy in the country and the largest amount of money ever endowed for a pharmacy dean's chair. On April 23 we held the Investiture of Dr. Patricia Chase as the Edward J. and Margaret F. Rowe Chair for the Dean of the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. The investiture is a formal academic ceremony to officially endow the chair. Each year money will be drawn from the interest realized from the endowment for faculty and staff development.



PA students at national competition



Butler continues as a partner in the RUAH Cap Grant, which provides services to the underserved in central Indiana. Through the Medication Access Program that COPHS helped to establish at each site, over \$2.4 million of medications have been provided to clinic patients at the participating sites. students completed patient care rotations at each of the sites over the last year. All sites were very impressed by the quality of the Butler Pharm.D. students.

One of these students, Lee Rhea, Pharm.D. (2004), completed his Pharm.D. thesis project with Kathy Wren, Pharm.D., and Jennifer Gray, Pharm.D., (both Butler graduates) at St. Vincent Randolph Hospital in Winchester, Ind. A Tribute to the Rowes

Edward J. and Margaret F. Rowe Chair for the Dean of COPHS

Edward and Margaret Rowe were lifelong educators, known by their colleagues and students alike for their thoroughness and determination. Fittingly, their estate gift to the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences will perpetuate the principles to which they dedicated their professional lives.

Ed Rowe graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1937 and earned his doctorate in

pharmacy there in 1941. He came to Indianapolis the same year, first teaching at the Indianapolis College of Pharmacy and then moving to Butler when the college moved there in 1945. For 41 years, he taught and served as head of Butler's Department of Pharmacy before retiring in 1982. He passed away in 1995.

Dr. Rowe was a past president of the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy and the American Association of Boards of Pharmacy. He also served 25 years as secretary-treasurer of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, District IV, and was a past national president of the Rho Chi Society.

The recipient of many honors and awards, he was given Butler's Baxter Award for excellence in teaching in 1955 and 1956. He also received the university's Holcomb Award in 1956 and was named one of its top 10 professors in 1962.

Margaret Rowe earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration from Indiana University in 1932, a master's degree from Northwestern University and an Ed.D. from Indiana University in 1973. She completed her doctorate while she was working full-time as the chair of the business education department at Arlington High School, traveling to Bloomington several evenings a week. Previous to her position at Arlington, Dr. Rowe held the same position at Howe High School.

Dr. Rowe taught at Butler as an adjunct professor in the secretarial sciences department before it was dissolved in the mid 1980s. She was also the co-author of *Applied Secretarial Practices*, a textbook that she revised several times and was in print for 25 years. Margaret Rowe passed away in 2003.

Both Edward and Margaret Rowe held their students to the same high standards to which they held themselves. They accepted nothing short of students' best work and students worked hard to meet those expectations. Students credit the Rowes for providing a rigorous experience that prepared them well for their careers. Because of these values this endowed chair is only fitting to be in their honor.

The Ralph M. Reahard Endowed Scholarship Fund has been established

Miss Sally Reahard passed away July 15, 2003, at the age of 95. Miss Sally was a longtime philanthropist in Indianapolis. She was the daughter of Ralph M. Reahard, who attended pharmacy college with Eli Lilly in Philadelphia. Mr. Reahard came to Indianapolis to work for Mr. Lilly and was vice president of production until his retirement in 1948. Upon his death, Miss Sally inherited Lilly stock and used the money to support her favorite causes. She lived in Indianapolis on Meridian Street until her death.

Miss Sally considered Butler University part of her neighborhood. The College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences was always an interest to her because her father's background was in pharmacy. To honor her father Miss Sally left \$1 million in her estate to COPHS to be used to help students pursue a degree in pharmacy. The Ralph M. Health Education Center opened April 15th


